Holy Communion is celebrated this Sunday at Trinity Lutheran Church in the glad confidence that our Lord, as His Words say, gives not only bread and wine, but also His true Body and Blood for us to eat and drink for the forgiveness of sins. Our Lord invites to His table those who believe He is truly present, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive as He forgives us. Because Saint Paul reminds us that we can receive the Lord's Supper to our judgment, we are very careful to administer the Sacrament only to those who are properly prepared. When we receive Holy Communion, we publicly declare our agreement with the teachings of the church from which we receive it. Therefore, if you are not yet a member of this congregation, a sister congregation of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and if you have not previously spoken to the Pastor about Holy Communion, please refrain from coming forward to receive Communion until you have first spoken with the Pastor. If you cannot receive the Lord's Supper but desire a blessing, please join us at the Communion rail and cross your arms over your chest to tell the pastor of your intent.

Gospel Mark 16:1-8 (ESV)

When the Sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. And they were saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance of the tomb?" And looking up, they saw that the stone had been rolled back — it was very large. And entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, dressed in a white robe, and they were alarmed. And he said to them, "Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here. See the place where they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going before you to Galilee. 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## Easter Day, the Resurrection of Our Lord<sup>1</sup>

This Day is the climax of the Church's Year, as the Fact it commemorates is the innermost center of the Christian's life and eternal hope. It is the *Feast of Feasts, the King of Days*. "The first day of the week" of the *Gospel* becomes the *Lord's Day*, uniquely His through His victory; and in joyful remembrance of the early Church kept this weekly commemoration of His Resurrection. This was not displaced, but emphasized, by the annual observance of the "historic" day as the *Lord's Day of Resurrection*, this and the *Paschal Day of the Resurrection* are its earliest names. ...

The Day, of course, is one of greatest, holiest joy. The contrast with the long fast and the emotions of preceding days adds to this effectively: the Church could hardly wait for its coming. Its celebration began with ringing of bells and glad acclaim at midnight, continuing till dawn. The churches were ablaze with candles and lights. Joyful the constant greeting, "Christ is risen!" and the answer, "He is risen indeed!"
